- Housing market is cooling as interest rates rise
- Unemployment extremely low at 3.8%
- Employment growth is slowing




Employment Growth -Annual


Housing Affordability Index Washington State





Median Home Resale Price Washington State









How healthy would you say your business is at this moment?




In the next 6 months, will your business experience ...




In the next 6 months, do you anticipate the number of employees at your company will:




Do you expect the Washington economy to enter a recession in the next year?




Has concern about the possibility of a recession caused you to do any of following?




How much has inflation increased your cost to do business in the last year?

Reasons for Optimism

- Inflation is slowing
- Washington faring better than other states, recovering jobs faster
- Rural areas recovered more quickly than Seattle
- Unemployment edged up, but it could be a good thing – more people entering or reentering the workforce





Reasons for Optimism

- State budget collections are strong
- 2023-25 ending balance has grown from \$23 million to \$1.2 billion
- No deficit on the horizon
- Less justification for raising taxes
- More talk of a "soft landing" instead of a recession



"We do have to realize that we don't have a printing press," Inslee said. "My opponent has made promises that we just cannot keep."

McKenna responded that he would push for business and occupation tax relief only after schools are "fully funded" and the higher education budget is boosted.

"It's not something we can afford to do right away," McKenna said. "If it's not part of your vision, you'll never attain it."
